Day Care Surgery (DCS) Services at Ispahani Islamia Eye Institute and Hospital

The Day Care Surgery (DCS) is an integral part of Ispahani Islamia Eye Institute & Hospital (IIEI&H) to help patients with specific need-based treatment. At IIEI&H, the Day Care Surgery unit provides high-quality pre and post-operative care to surgical patients, avoiding the need for overnight hospitalization. DCS patients can have the procedure on an outpatient basis, and be monitored in the DCS unit for a defined period after the procedure, as necessary. There after patients are discharged and returned home the same day. The DCS unit is run by a team of highly on skilled and experienced nurses and serves patients undergoing

outpatient procedures in the Ophthalmology area which includes cataract surgery, ROP screening, and laser, probing, intraocular antiVEGF injections, patients with corneal injury, foreign body removals etc.

Benefits of Day Care Surgery (DCS) at IIEI&H

- ❖ Shorter stay in hospital for patients, hence reducing the risk of hospital-acquired infection.
- ❖ Significantly reduces stress and anxiety of patients in the post-surgical period.
- ❖ Cost-effective and economical, both for the patient and the hospital.

- ❖ Well-equipped bed with all support facilities.

Supportive supervision for influencing training outcome

Background: The process of assessing the outcome and impact of training is always a difficult job. The overall objective of the training, in general, is to strengthen the knowledge and skills of the participants. The usual expectation of the training unit of an organization is that the participants, after receiving training, will apply their training learning in their work situation. But the reality on the ground shows that many of the participants, after coming back from the training do not want to shift from their traditional practice unless they are supervised. Many training organizations design and implement a supervisory activity to make sure that the training participants are applying the knowledge and skills (that they learn from the training) properly in their respective workplaces.

The Training Department of IIEI&H is obligated to carry out an activity named “supervision for influencing training outcome” which, in most cases, becomes difficult for the Training Department alone, to cover the huge number of training participants because of its limited manpower. Therefore, besides the Training Department, if the responsibility of carrying out the supervisory activity is also done by the supervisors of those departments from where participants

are sent for training, a better outcome is more likely to be achieved. The outcome of the training means the positive change in the practice and performance of the training participants that becomes visible immediately after training, such as a trained staff member following the right procedure and techniques towards accomplishing the assigned task.

Impact of the training means the ultimate results of the training which might take a longer time to become visible, such as quality of the service, e.g., all patients are satisfied with the services provided to them. The complexity in assessing impact is that there are compounding factors there are difficult to comprehend. For example, the service quality improvement might also be contributed by not only good training of the employees but also good supervision and administrative supports, good working environment etc.

Therefore, the Training Department has planned and implemented to focus on strengthening the supervision after each training activities involving supervisors of respective departments. The whole process has been narrated below.

Supervision after training: Initially, we have involved three departments of IIEI&H which are OSS, NSS, and Optometry. All supervisors of the aforementioned three departments were oriented on how to carry out the follow-up after training activity using a “matrix “developed by the Training Department. The “**matrix-for supervision after training**” activity contains, names of training courses with major contents of individual training courses, parameters focusing on expected practices (skills) of the participants, and responses (0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) of the participants. For perfect the score given is at 5, for partial implementation put 4, or 3 or 2 or 1 but for wrong practice put 0. The supervisors are asked to take immediate measures to correct them for any wrong practices observed. Following the orientation of the supervisors, one round of follow-up was done by all the supervisors in October 2023.

A sample of the “matrix-for follow-up after training” is as mentioned below.

Experience of Dr. Mark Ng'ang'a as a Foreign fellow at IIEI&H

I am Dr. Mark Ng'ang'a, a general Ophthalmologist from Kenya. I am happy to have had the privilege of undergoing a short-term fellowship in Phacoemulsification cataract surgery, at Ispahani Islamia Eye Institute and Hospital. During the 6-week course, I had the opportunity to be trained, observe, assist, and work with experienced Ophthalmologists, and surgeons as my trainers, teachers, and mentors. The initial phase of the training period which was in the wet lab under a Phaco. development Specialist. This period was very interesting with a lot of practical and hands-on learning, using animal Eyes and the phaco machine, the training focused on the development of surgical skills, as well as gaining familiarity with cutting-edge Phaco-emulsification equipment, while concurrently attending theatre to observe and assist while learning from the trainers.

After this, during the clinical exposure period, and under the guidance of skilled surgeons and trainers, I learned the art of patient selection, pre-operative assessment, and the use of relevant advanced diagnostic tests including, slit lamp examination, corneal topography, the classical and latest biometry tests such as the Lenstar and the IOL master 700. During my rotation and placement in the operating theatre, I practically applied and learned the surgical techniques involved in Phaco-emulsification such as corneal incisions, Sculpting, and nucleus management, and also refined my small Incision Cataract (SICS) surgical skills, under close supervision of experienced Surgeons and trainers. Beyond surgical aspects, the entire theatre staff team in the operating theatres emphasizes the importance of aseptic theatre procedures, sterility, patient handling, time and schedule management, and effective theater notes and record-keeping. During the post-operative period, we examined the patients, presented and discussed with the Ophthalmologists on post-operative management, patient outcomes, and potential complications of cataract surgery, this allowed me to appreciate the importance of patient outcomes and satisfaction.

It was a valuable eye-opening training where, I learned something new and of value every day from my Trainers, the experienced nursing staff, my fellow students, from members of other departments and vital technical teams, such as the CSSD, the biometry and OCT/Specular microscopy department, the Hospitality department etc. every day. I appreciated and enjoyed the friendly, approachable, and collaborative workplace culture at Ispahani Islamia Eye Institute Hospital.

This culture of cooperation, communication, and a sense of shared responsibility has impressed upon me the values. There is a feeling of collaboration between different departments, and the contribution of each member is valued. I appreciate the Staff and members of the Education department, they are very helpful, concerned, and always ready to teach, answer questions and concerns, and always care about our well-being and comfort during the course. The Hospital's hospitality and catering department staff were also very good to me and the accommodation was comfortable and hospitable and the meals were good. As a foreign fellow, my stay and experience in Bangladesh and Dhaka city for the first time was very wonderful. I managed to make new friends, visit the city, and experience the local culture. This has been an exciting period and experience which has broadened my horizons and created lasting memories. In conclusion, my short-term ophthalmology fellowship was an enlightening experience that has provided a strong foundation for my future career. The training has improved my clinical skills, deepened my understanding of ophthalmology and Ophthalmology surgery, and reinforced the importance of compassionate patient care. Experience of Dr. Adam Mohamed Ibrahim as Foreign Fellow

My name is Dr. Adam Mohamed Ibrahim, a general ophthalmologist from Somalia. I came to Bangladesh to attend an 8-week cataract surgery fellowship in Small Incision Cataract Surgery (SICS). In the first two weeks of the fellowship, I attended an ophthalmic wet lab where I performed every step of the procedure under the direct supervision of my trainer and spent one to two hours in the operations theatre for observation and assisting. For the following weeks, I started operating under the direct supervision of different mentors under very experienced trainers of IIEI&H. All OT staff helped me during the operation and guided me in every step I did in every case. From my first case, I started following up on my cases on the first postoperative day, filled the logbook, and closed the case with the mentor of that case. Besides these two main phases (wet lab and OT), there were integrated activities to enhance our objectives like lectures, pre-op and post-op department activities, and surgical video discussion. On the other side of the hospital staff, I had the experience I had never imagined. From the highest authority to the security guard and cleaner, I found them respectful, welcoming, and helpful with whatever I needed. During my training, I found my mentors and other seniors asking specific questions but very important to me repeatedly, "Do you have any problem with your surgical steps?" after I told them my weakness they gave me enough time to explain deeply. Therefore, my mentor's comments filled the gaps in my skills gradually until I felt confident. From the start to the end of my training, I had a trainer who was the backbone of each trainee, other than the wet lab trainer, he followed us to each department facilitating our activities and planning them. In conclusion, I found the people of Bangladesh peaceful and I had never felt that I was in a foreign country.
